





- Pass the OSSLT
- 40 hours of Community Service
- *** there is an "opt out" option





The Ontario Ministry of Education's Creating Pathways to Success document grounds our belief that: all students can be successful, success comes in many forms and there are many pathways to success.

APPLIED ENGLISH

- More complex texts with emphasis on implicit practical use of oral and written language reasoning
- for everyday life
- Frequent shorter writing tasks
- ISU involves exploring a topic of interest and completing non-fiction tasks
- Significant class time allotted for assignment completion/reading, but unfinished work becomes homework

lower Teacher/Student ratio than academic

ACADEMIC ENGLISH

- analytical writing developing a more sophisticated writing style
- ISU based on a novel read independently & a significant investment of time outside of class
- essays that involve analyzing & interpreting
- group and individual assignments are begun in class to allow for feedback, but completed for homework
- expectation that students will work **independently** and seek out help when

needed

DECODING A COURSE CODE

These three letters identify the subject. The first letter in the course code denotes the course's department area:

A = Arts

H = Social Sciences and Humanities

C = Canadian & World Studies G = Guidance & Career Education

B = Business

M = Mathematics

E = English

P = Physical Education

F = French

T = Technology



The number grade identifies the GRADE:

1 = Grade 9 2 = Grade 10 3 = Grade 11 4 = Grade 12



The letter identifies the course type:

D = Academic P = Applied L = Locally Developed

O = Open



The number identifies how the course is delivered:

1 = Regular Day



HOW TO SELECT COURSES OVERVIEW



- 1. Add courses to your High School Plan
- 2. Review Course Selections
- 3. Submit Course Selections
- 4. Click **Send Approval Email** put in a valid parent/guardian email address
- 5. Parent approves courses via email
- 6. **Guidance Counsellor** approves your selections

myBlueprint ERRORS!

- If you get a RED alert: it means there is an error in your planner (e.g. no prerequisite) because you chose incorrectly
 OR you are going to take the pre-req in summer school
- If you get a **RED** alert because you made an **error**, fix before submitting.
- If you get a RED alert for summer school,
 type in the ADD COMMENTS box what course you are going to be taking in summer school (for example:
 - "I will be taking CHV2O1 & GLC2O1 in summer school")

SUMMER SCHOOL INFO

SUMMER SCHOOL

You can take summer school if:

- you failed a course and it is offered in summer school
 (2 weeks Credit Recovery)
- you want to upgrade a mark (4 weeks full credit)
- you want to reach ahead (4 weeks full credit)
 *** eLearning or in person options

NEW THIS YEAR: SUMMER SCHOOL registration is open AT THE SAME TIME AS COURSE SELECTIONS!




All registrations are done on YOUR MyBlueprint account.

SUMMER SCHOOL

To indicate you are planning on taking a course in summer school do the following in myBlueprint:

- 1. Do **NOT select** the course you are wanting/needing to take (e.g. CHV2O1 & GLC2O1) in myBlueprint planner
- 2. Instead, choose a different course in place of that course in your myBlueprint planner
- 3. When you submit you MUST type a comment in the ADD COMMENTS box telling us WHAT COURSE you are going to be signing yourself up for in Summer School
 - "I am taking CHV2O1 &GLC2O1 in summer school"
