


# HOW TO SPEAK COURSE CODE

#### **Decoding a Course Code**

Courses use a 6-character course code for Identification.

- · The first 5 characters of the course code are set out by the Ministry of Education.
- The sixth character is used by school boards to identify a specific characteristic of the course.
   For example, French Immersion is identified in the DDSB with an "F".



You will then choose CHV/GLC from the **Continuing Education>Explore Courses** option in your myBlueprint and register for Summer School (in person at Sinclair or online) **at the same time as course selection**.
