Certificate of Accomplishment

Students working towards a Certificate of Accomplishment may take K-courses, which are alternative, non-credit courses for students with special education needs. These courses are designed to support the growth of fundamental skills, independence, and self-care. For example, Money Management and Personal Banking (KBBANP) and Transit Training and Community (KCCANV) are two possible course offerings.

*Students who are leaving secondary school upon reaching the age of 18 without having met the requirements for the OSSD or the OSSC may be granted a Certificate of Accomplishment. It is a useful means of recognizing achievement for students who plan to take certain kinds of training or who plan to find employment directly after leaving school. It is accompanied by the student's Ontario Student Transcript and their Individual Education Plan (IEP), where applicable.





CHOOSING MY SUCCESS!

- Ensuring all Grade 8 students transitioning to Grade 9 will make thoughtful course selection choices reflective of their commitment to their own potential and success in high school and beyond.
- Ensuring all Grade 8 students have the opportunity to learn about their strengths and interests while investigating various viable pathways options for their initial post-secondary destination such as: Apprenticeship, College, Community Living, University, and the World of Work.



De-Streaming

- De-streaming is the process of stopping the harmful practices of forcing students and families to select a single pathway for their secondary education. By De-streaming grade 9, students and families have an additional year of high school to decide on a particular pathway and keep course options open.
- In September 2021 all school boards offered De-streamed math (MTH1W).
- In September 2022, all school boards will be offering De-streamed science (SNC1W).
- In September 2022, the grade 9 applied courses codes for English, Geography, and French will be retired.
- In September 2023, all school boards will be offering De-streamed English (ENL1W).

Streaming upholds systems of oppression, hurting marginalized students the most. Black and Indigenous students, low-income students, students with special needs, and learning English as a second language are disproportionately placed into non-academic streams. — CASE

Ministry Goals for De-Streaming

The Ministry has three main goals for De-streaming, which have been informed by a review of research on successful De-streaming initiatives over the last thirty years.

- Cultural shifts in schools and boards to identify and dismantle systemic discrimination and structural inequities
- Increased educator capacity for effective culturally responsive instruction, assessment and evaluation in de-streamed classes
- 3. Increased student engagement, achievement and well-being

59% of students who took the Grade 9 Applied mathematics course transitioned into post- secondary education within 7 years, compared to 88% of students who took the Academic course.






